Leaving a Wild Area

Why are they needed?

Wild areas in a garden provide 2 main things for hedgehogs: a natural food source, and potential nest sites. If you keep your garden diverse with plenty of wild corners, hedges and plants; then you are attracting the natural food source of the hedgehog. Hedgehogs eat a variety of insects, molluscs and other invertebrates such as earthworms, caterpillars, earwigs, beetles and larvae to name a few.

These wild areas also provide the perfect shelter for hedgehogs needing a quick nest, or the perfect material such as grasses, leaves, plant cover, shrub cover and so on to make the perfect Winter hibernation nest or Summer nest for hoglets!

Some Examples:

- Hedges/Hedgerows
- Wildflower patches
- General overgrown bramble patches or nettle patches
- Bordering flowerbeds or shrubs
- Small patches of woodland/tree coverage
- Patches of longer grasses that aren't mowed
- Natural leaf litter
- Low-growing shrub patches
- Diverse mixes of grass, clover, nettle
